Paul N. Anderson serves as Professor of Biblical and Quaker Studies at George Fox University, and also as Extraordinary Professor of Religion at the North-West University of Potchefstroom, South Africa. A graduate of Malone University (BA), ESR (MDiv), and Glasgow University (PhD), Paul also served as pastor at West River Friends Meeting, Reedwood Friends Church, and Clackamas Park Friends Church. Author of five books and editor of thirty more, Paul's books include Following Jesus, The Riddles of the Fourth Gospel, and From Crisis to Christ. He edits three book series (including FAHE's Quakers and the Disciplines Series), and he edited Evangelical Friend and Quaker Religious Thought. He and his wife Carla have three grown daughters, and they live in Newberg, Oregon.

Cherice Bock lives in Oregon, on the lands of the Kalapuya (now part of the Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde). She is adjunct professor of ecotheology at Portland Seminary, and she leads Oregon Interfaith Power & Light at Ecumenical Ministries of Oregon. She began teaching in the theology department at University of Portland in the fall of 2020.

A recorded Quaker minister, Bock sees environmental concerns as one of this generation's most important social justice issues. Her academic work focuses on nonviolent theology, Quakerism, contextual theologies, feminism, environmental justice, and ecotheology. Bock has served as a scholar in residence and annual sessions speaker at a number of Friends meetings and yearly meetings on the topics of climate justice and ecotheology.

DO YOU BELIEVE IT?

"Quakers have a compelling message for our world" "Why are we not living into that message?"

hese words were spoken to me by a person who is new to Friends and is fairly new to Western Yearly Meeting. She went on to list several testimonies as being of particular interest to those who fall into the Millennials (age 26-41) and Generation Z (10-25 yrs. old). I listened intently to her list which includes some of the following:

- "Spaciousness" to not only listen to God speak, but to take a break from the incessant noise of social media, mass media, and all the things that scream for our attention.
- She mentioned the attraction to what she called "shared authority." We give one another authority because we believe that each of us can hear God speak and that even the little ones and the poor and the marginalized can lead us.
- The "Capacity to Connect" more broadly. Our Quaker understanding of all of life being sacramental -
 - * that God is speaking in the everyday, mundane acts as well as the times that we "plan" for sacred space,
 - * that sacredness expands to our experience in nature,
 - * the majesty of everything from a prairie to a lazy river, to the fascination of a hummingbird.

have heard others list the so-called Quaker S.P.I.C.E.S. as a gift to a world that often struggles to find hope. Amid school shootings, a worsening climate, abusive church experiences, war, and a long list of hope-dashing moments, we are needed to embody the saltiness and light we testify to. Quakers embrace peace, equality, simplicity, etc. as a part of our testimony. How can we demonstrate with our actions, the hope we have as loved Children of Light shining against darkness?

What if we lived more fully into these treasures that grow out of our understanding of God and God's deep love for us? Some of these testimonies will be met with suspicion, but I think that each person has a deep longing for these. Moments of real peace, justice, and integrity fan to flame God's Goodness within our hearts. We are warmed and drawn to Christ.

We are not called to be Methodists, Catholics, Evangelicals, or some other religious classification. As Quakers we are called to live into the calling and vision that God has called us to. Can we do that as Western Yearly Meeting? I have hope that we can walk into the future together with the vision of God's Peaceable Kingdom welling in our hearts.

Do you believe that? Really?

SPIRITUAL DIRECTION OPPORTUNITIES

Since 1991 the Benedict Inn Retreat & Conference Center in Beech Grove has offered a two-year ecumenical program designed to assist individuals in developing skills in the art of spiritual direction. A new cohort is being gathered for the 2022/23 term, which will begin in September 2022. Interns will discern if one is being called to the ministry of spiritual direction, will develop skills necessary to be a spiritual director, and enrich one's own spiritual life. It is an inclusive program for both clergy and laity.

The spiritual direction internship includes four semesters with 9 sessions in each semester, held on

Mondays from 4-9:15 pm. A pre-requisite is that each applicant is currently engaged in personal spiritual direction. (If a spiritual director is needed, the Benedict Inn can offer suggestions from a list of over 200 trained directors.) Applications are now being taken through June for this formation which begins in the Fall. Participants also have the option of receiving credit through Christian Theological Seminary. 

IS YOUR MEETING TAKING ADVANTAGE OF C M & E GRANTS?

The WYM Christian Ministries and Evangelism Board, Subcommittee on Meeting Development and Nurture has grants available for Monthly Meetings and Individual Members in Western Yearly Meeting. Monthly Meeting grants are annual grants and can be applied for once each year. The maximum for Monthly Meeting grants is \$3,000. Individual member grants can be applied for once each year with a maximum amount of \$500. Our goal is to encourage the spiritual growth of both Meetings and individuals; but, many times the needs of Meetings to maintain their facilities comes to the forefront. There are no specific dates or deadlines for submitting grant applications. If grant applications are received near the time of regularly scheduled board meetings in March and November, they will be reviewed by the board then. If applications are received at other times, applications will be circulated to the board members for review by email. It takes about 6 weeks after submission for a grant application to be reviewed and if approved, for the funds to be transferred.

The first of the next week, what arrived, but a new queen size comforter! We promptly delivered it to her house! Excitement!

f course, no matter what the sign says about what we will accept, a big black bulky baby stroller arrives that somebody left in a hallway while we were working. "What in the world are we going to do with this? Where are we going to put it?" Thirty minutes later two moms walk in looking at everything one says, "Is this someone's stroller? I really need one." She had two babies under two. Our response: "Yes ma'am, it belongs to you."

Praise the Lord we have a limited storage room. However, God hadn't planned us storing it at all. He knew!

God works in mysterious ways. We have been blessed with people giving and receiving. There is an involvement. People are coming inside the church doors, maybe not for summer sermons, but for God's love and visiting, talking and conversing.
