Embracing

Embracing Change

My local coffeeshop used to display a tip jar with a small sign that read, "if you fear change, leave it here". A clever wordplay on what is a significant issue for many people. Change is hard. It is especially difficult when it means wrestling with our values and our deeply engrained traditions. We begrudgingly admit that to live is to experience change, but we can be very resistant to change.

On the survey I sent to many of our WYM leaders this summer, there were a high percentage of responders who mentioned something about the need for change. Looking back through the surveys it did not take long to find a few responses that suggested change is needed.

"A willingness to change so that growth can happen."

"We continue to be stuck in old ways."

"I wish we could shake a little traditionalism."

"I want to see us planting Meetings in new places, reaching a new population that perhaps has no experience of Quakers."

"I long for us to let go of our fears, our anxieties and all the what-ifs, so that we can be more fully the people/Quakers that God and the world need us to be."

"A more flexible approach to doing church."

While the nature of a survey, calls for forward-looking responses, it is obvious to me that there is a strong representation of our YM that feels we need to bring forward-looking change if we hope to fully live into God's call for us. Sometimes that means saying yes to something that feels new or uncomfortable. Sometimes it means letting go of something that no longer has life.

Of course, change itself is not the goal, and just any change won't do, though I might argue that mixing things up from time to time gives us fresh perspective. Even the survival of the institution of our Meeting or YM is not the goal. The goal is a deeper faith that calls us to expressions of love that are transformative for ourselves, our Meetings, and the world. I happen to think that when lived out, our Meetings will be seen as a bright light.

Of course, I am all too glad to express how others need to change while my willingness to prompt change in myself lags. But, it must begin in each of us. Our own growth and transformation make it possible to offer grace to others.

Here are some queries that we can ask ourselves as we consider change. I hope you will take some time in quiet to sit with these prompts. What is the Spirit saying? Am I willing to respond? I'd love to hear your thoughts.

What fear/anxiety do I carry that keeps me from living fully into the life Christ wants for me?

Who do I suspect that God has been nudging me about recently? Who needs my encouragement, or prayer, or forgiveness, or unconditional acceptance?

What would it look like for me to be a supporter of change in our meeting? Think back over the past year, am I more likely to say "yes" or "no" to a new idea?

Greetings to Friends Everywhere:

Western Yearly Meeting met in Plainfield, Indiana from July 27-30, 2023 for its 166th annual session to explore the theme, "You are the Light of the World" based on Matthew 5:14-16. Throughout the meeting, a large mural illustrating the theme was available for attendees to share in coloring the pattern. Brilliant markers and stimulating conversation while working allowed the Lights of many individuals to leave a lasting impression of the meeting.

Pam and Ron Ferguson of Winchester, Indiana Friends, conducted our morning worship times. They were able to share their local and overseas personal experiences to illustrate how the presence of Light in their lives has allowed them to remain powerful in situations of powerlessness. In doing so, they encouraged each of us to share the inward Light of God in the darkness of the world, trusting God to make the best use of that witness.

Superintendent Shawn McConaughey facilitated an open discussion on Thursday morning. Examining the question, "Where is Western Yearly Meeting Headed," he encouraged us to honestly evaluate the mission of Western Yearly Meeting and the mission of each of our individual meetings. He challenged us to "think differently' in order to meet the changing needs of individuals in today's world. Thursday afternoon, a time of remembrance allowed us to celebrate the lives of those who have died in the last year and how each of them "shared the Light" during their time with us. They and their wisdom are, and will continue to be, missed. Thursday evening, Shawn shared how "Love Fuels our Light," in a message of hope, reality, and optimism. He pointed out that life does not exist without change, and change depends on making choices. Deciding not to decide is a choice that leads to stagnation, decline, and eventual death. After the inspiring and motivating messages of the day, attendees gathered to share their lives and the day's impact with each other over watermelon and fruit kabobs.

Routine business was conducted Friday and Saturday. WYM continues to be financially stable. Written reports included in attendance packets enabled only brief summaries, questions, and approval of action items to be addressed during active sessions. One of the more interesting reports was presented by Rachel Doll-O'Mahoney. This report reviewed results of an ongoing project to discern the needs and concerns of those between ages 21 and 41. This information was enlightening and will help WYM and its individual meetings determine how they need to adapt moving forward.

As is customary, multiple workshops were available on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday. These included programs on the Friends United Meeting projects in Tanzania and South Sudan (Turkana); prophetic thought and Quaker theology; supporting

and attracting young-ish adults; estate planning; Quaker engagement strategies as they pertain to legislation on poverty and affordable housing; ideas and resources to help local meetings enliven Vacation Bible School and Sunday School programs; solar power as a renewable energy option; experiences in revitalizing growth and community; an FWCC workshop; and how Right Sharing of World Resources (RSWR) is continuing to impact families around the world including Guatemala.

The Quaker Lecture presented by J. Brent Bill on Friday night was thought-provoking. The title, "Living Witnesses: How do Quakers Speak to Today," examined how the Quakers of today sometimes struggle to explain what we stand <u>for</u> today rather than what we are <u>against</u>. Brent's statement, "... in the Quaker tradition, true spiritual witness, at its best, is rooted in positivity." speaks to today's conditions. While our historical past is important, it is what we are doing and living out NOW that will speak to people today. The Quaker lecture was followed by fellowship over strawberry shortcake and ice cream.

A highlight of the business session on Saturday morning was the recommendation for Recording of Gifts for Ministry of Ben Snyder. Many supportive letters from Carmel Friends Meeting were read and friends present spoke in support of Ben's ministry; the recommendation was approved heartily. Saturday afternoon included a missions report on FUM and triennial from Friends United Meeting, followed by a time for the gathering and business of Quaker Men and United Society of Friends Women groups. These gatherings were then followed by a "Ministry Fair" highlighting ways to be involved in, and aware of, the many ministries of WYM. "Family Night" closed the evening with an evening celebration of fun, trivia, music, and a 1950's Soda Fountain treat time.

Sunday's program "The Light of Hope" was led by Ron and Pam Ferguson. It included the Recording of Gifts for Ministry of Ben Snyder (Carmel Friends.) This closing service reminded us that the Light of Hope shines onward to the future.



Mooresville Friends

Approximately 70 people helped celebrate the 200th Anniversary of the founding of White Lick Monthly Meeting of Friends in Mooresville. The Meeting had invited anyone who wanted to attend as well as members of the two Meetings that were a part of Blue River Quarterly Meeting in 1823 which

set off White Lick Monthly Meeting. In addition, the six Monthly Meetings (Bloomingdale, Bethel, Fairfield, Plainfield, West Union, and Union {currently Westfield}) and former pastors were also invited to attend the weekend festivities. On Saturday, August 19, John Connell gave a lecture on the history of the Meeting which was followed by a cake and punch reception at the Friendship House. At 3:30 PM several attendees journeyed to the Mooresville Consolidated School Corporation Newby Campus (just north of the Meetinghouse) to visit the Academy Building. This building was originally founded by White Lick Meeting as a high school and was the first high school in Central Indiana.

On Sunday, August 20, at worship the original minute for the formation of the Monthly Meeting was read by clerk, John Heshelman. Jeff Wells of Blue River Meeting gave the message. Following worship, attendees were invited to have cake and punch again at the Friendship House.

All attendees on both Saturday and Sunday were asked to sign a piece of fabric to be made into a quilt later this year.

As the 2023 edition of the Indiana State Fair winds down, Friends at Russiaville were provided with a familiar "Quaker taste" of the Fair during their Sunday, August 13 meal following monthly meeting for business. For many years, Valley Mills Friends Meeting had a food booth near the heart of the State Fairgrounds.
