The True Cross

I was leading a group of fifth graders from St. Susanna's School on a history tour through the Yearly Meeting Building and as we settled in the Plainfield Meeting room I asked if there were any questions. One boy asked "If this is a church, why isn't there a cross?" A good question that needed a good answer. I tried to explain, on a fifth grade level, about early Friends concerns with outward symbols that got in the way of experiencing God in a more direct way.

Here is a longer answer to the fifth grader's question:

There might not be an outward representation of a cross in our building, but there is a cross in Friends worship. It has been there from the beginning. George Fox talks about the cross in one of his letters:

Friends, all that are sensible of the Power of God ...live in it and grow up in it. For the Power of God is over the power of the devil, which Power of God is the Gospel and it is called the Cross of Christ. ... For Christ redeemed his people out of their vain conversation, purchased them with his blood and is become the Head of the Church.

At the heart of our faith is the concern for a restored relationship with God. Early Quakers, like Christians before them, understood the cross as part of this process of restoration. However, they differed with their contemporaries on how this worked. The most widely held views about the restoration involved external transactions of some sort. The cross had been understood as paying a ransom or payment to Satan for his claims on us, or as a satisfaction of God's standard of righteousness through the death of Christ, or as Christ substituting his life for ours on the cross.

For early Quakers the cross was not just an outward symbol or an external transaction but the inner reality of what George Fox called the 'true Cross." Christ allowed himself to be put to death on the cross, so that we can take up our cross and allow all that is outward to be put to death in us. "Who his own self bare our sins in his own body on the tree, that we, being dead to sins, should live unto righteousness: by whose stripes ye were healed." (I Peter 2:21-24 KJV)

The crucifixion and resurrection of Christ is a demonstration of the power of God over the power of sin and we experience this power by following Christ to the true cross, the Power of God within.

Let me leave you with a challenge from George Fox:

And keep in the Cross of Christ, the Power of God, that keeps you crucified to the world, that is, dead to the world and the world dead and crucified to you ... Let in the spirit of the world, you let in his god which will crucify the good in you . . . therefore, keep that crucified with the Power of God, the Cross of Christ....

- 3.) Have each group prepare for the 40 Days of Prayer by studying the book, **Come Pray** (available at our online bookstore, www.fum.org/shop)
- 4.) Study and pray together in your groups starting 10 October using the booklet, 40 Days of Prayer, as your guide.
- 5.) Participate in the *Day of Discernment*. Join together in worship and reflection to consider and respond to a common set of queries focusing on the future of Friends United Meeting.

Thoughts from Dr. John Williams, General Superintendent, 2012 Outgoing Epistle, Evangelical Friends Church-Eastern Region.

"Dr. William s' message was on Exodus 14 and our "Dealing with Red Sea Moments." At many times we find ourselves feeling stuck/trapped in situations, as the Israelites in the book of Exodus. Dr. Williams told us that 1) God wants us to cry out to him. Many times, we blame the wrong person or have a distorted view of history. 2) God wants us to stand down. We need to stop being angry, fussing and fuming about situations. The Lord will fight the battle for us, so we need to stand down and let him



fight for us. 3) God wants us to move out. God has something for us to do and we need to get ready to start moving. There is something for you to do and you can do something. 4) God wants us to look out. We need to be looking for the blessings that God is providing and is intervening on our behalf. Dr. Williams cautioned us to be careful not to have repeated blindness to what has happened to us and we need to learn from our past."



There is a "**Peace Pipe**" at Indianapolis First Friends each Sunday for collecting funds for the Heifer Project. The Peace Pipe is a long plastic tube that can hold 480 quarters, or \$120. 480 quarters is enough to purchase a goat, sheep, or pig than can provide milk, meat, muscle-power, manure, materials, money, and motivation for a family living in poverty.

Intern Mission Experience in NYC

The Interns and I had a wonderful experience on our recent trip to New York City. I wanted to take this opportunity to tell you all a little bit about it.





Our first service was at Brooklyn Teen Challenge. This is a residential rehab facility that helps people tap into the power of Christ to break the chains of addiction. They have a chapel service every week that we had the privilege of leading. As a part of the worship, each of the Interns (Sarah Medlin, Nathan Pedigo, Andrew Heald) gave testimonies about how God is working in their lives

and how He is using them to further His kingdom.

They did a fantastic job!

The next two days we worked with the New York City Relief Bus. This is an organization that draws from Matthew 25 in answering Christ's call to feed and clothe those who have found themselves in need. Our job was to serve food, and pray with those who came to accept the food we had to offer. We found this challenging, but insightful. Stepping out and striking up conversation with complete

strangers is not easy...especially when there is a language barrier, as was the case much of the time. God was

faithful in helping us to see His hand in meeting people's needs.



Our last day we visited QUNO (Quaker United Nations Office). There, we learned about some of the work Quakers are doing around the world to help find alternatives to violent conflict. One of the key actions of QUNO is to give space for intentional, "off the record" conversation between influential people who can work towards the mission of peace.

We also spent some time seeing New York City and visiting some popular sights. Each Intern was given the charge, at some

point during the week, to be our navigator. It was their job to lead us to the right subway trains and get us where we needed to go. Again, the leadership they each showed was impressive.
