The Kingdom of God

Recently on Mondays we have been gathering for unprogrammed worship, lunch and conversation. We were talking about the Kingdom of God this past Monday and it got me thinking about the great legacy of Quaker historical figures that were change agents in this world and who acted out of a belief that the Kingdom of God was at hand.

George Fox opened up our direct experience of the Inner Teacher, John Woolman spent 30 years encouraging Quakers to live out the equality testimony by denouncing slavery, Elizabeth Fry challenged the prison system and changed it forever, William Penn established a new type of society and welcomed all including Native Americans. Many Quakers did not condemn Indian religious practices but saw "that of God in them". The equality of women and the very early acceptance of female leadership within the Quaker denomination are all amazing examples of being on the leading edge of social change.

But this all came about because certain Quakers believed deeply in the proclamation from Jesus about the good news of God; 'the time is fulfilled and the Kingdom of God is at hand, repent and believe in the good news.' (Mark 1:14-15)

What might we do today if we really believed that the Kingdom of Heaven were at hand? Excerpted From Indianapolis First Friends, *Friend to Friend*, by Beth Henricks. Beth is one of two people in the recording process in WYM.



Breakfeast at Fairfield Friends

Many F/friends may remember the old Fairfield Feast and Country Store, which has been a standard at Fairfield for many years. Attendance at the event has been down the past several years and Fairfield has decided to try something a little different.

Recently at <u>Mooresville</u> <u>Friends Mtg.</u> an A/C water leak combined with the age of the existing ceiling (about 40 years old) result-

ed in the collapse of a portion of the Sanctuary ceiling. After an immediate cleanup of the resulting damage, the Property Trustees began working with local ceiling companies and insur-

ance company adjusters to determine the best course of action.

Since the restoration will require the removal and storage of the pews (in an outside container)., it became appar-



ent that this would be a good time to also replace the carpet in the Sanctuary.

As a part of replacing the ceiling, the sanctuary's chandeliers will be removed and then reinstalled.



Considering the age of the fixtures, it was further proposed that the chandeliers be replaced at this time. Since the insurance settlement is already paying for removing and reinstalling the fixtures,

this would be the most economical time to re-place the fixtures.

God did not let Mooresville know that it was time to work on their sanctuary, but His laws of nature seems to have made it possible.

But that's not the end of the story. This last Sunday, I visited <u>Amo</u> <u>Friends Meeting.</u> The recent hail storm that went through damaged their roof. With the insurance settlement, they plan to get a metal roof, and use the surplus to repair siding.

God is taking care of Amo also.
