is a solemn religious

observance in the liturgical calendar of many Christian denominations that begins on Ash Wednesday, February 18, and covers a period of approximately six weeks until April 2. The traditional purpose of Lent is the preparation of belief through prayer, penance, repentance of sins, almsgiving, atonement and selfdenial. This event, along with other pious customs, is observed by Christians in the Anglican, Calvinist, Lutheran, Methodist, and Roman Catholic traditions.

Quakers typically don't participate in the customs of Lent. They considered this as an empty ritual and a part of the Church of England that they chose not to observe. Quakers believe that we should be doing it (prayer, repentance, self-denial) all the time, not just during the season of Lent. Quakers believe if there is something you need to give up in order to be closer to God, then you should/can give it up any time God leads you to do that.

William Penn's father sent Penn to France to learn to be a gentleman, and forget his silly ideas about being a Quaker. When William Penn came back from France, he wore the outfit of the upper class, which included a sword. He asked George Fox how long he should wear his sword. Fox responded by saying as long as you can. Penn not only gave up the sword but the other

trappings of being in the upper class in order to pay more attention to God

John Woolman would not eat a meal that was served by slaves. He believed that he was no better than the slaves and valued slaves as humans, not as slaves. When he gave up the idea of slavery, it cleared his spirit/soul to be closer to God and not cluttered by thinking about people in slavery as less than human.

People cannot live healthy lives if they do not have access to clean water and good sanitation facilities. A child cannot learn when they are hungry. Patients sometimes cannot leave the hospital because they are unable to pay their bill. The 2015 WYM Outreach Board Special Project goal is to raise \$12,000 for Health and Education in East Africa. The money raised will be divided equally among the following three areas: Water and Sanitation in Kenya and Uganda, the Lindi School in Nairobi, Kenya, and Lugulu Hospital in Kenya.

Eldon Studer is the coordinator of all activity at the disaster site. He is our representative to *Indiana Volunteers Active in Disaster.*






2015 Workcamp Opportunity
