"Sticks and stones may break my bones, but names will never hurt me." I remember hearing this shouted by a boy on a school playground many years ago. He was being teased by another boy, and this was his reply. These words are from an old nursery rhyme and have the same impact today that were conveyed by the boy years ago.

Today we are dealing with bullying on the playground, in political campaigning, world governments, and many social situations. What is my response? What would be your response? More hurtful words and actions? All too often today, social media is tagged with keeping the rhetoric going, and the only answer is to "turn it off"!!

In a recent issue of "Fruit of the Vine", a devotional provided by our Meeting, Betty Hockett, a frequent contributor, has some suggestions. She writes about "good speak and bad speak." She asks what words do we say? What words have we stored in our language center? What words have rubbed off from other people? Are these words I want to store and use?

Mrs. Hockett suggests that in "good speak" we accentuate the positive, use words of encouragement, use words of love, and to use words of prayer as guides. In using "good speak" or positive words, we can create a better environment for our inter-action with other people. "Good speak" is responsible speak. It is anticipating the impact of the words we use.

Words and pictures seem to be grabbing our attention in "the world out there". Can we check our brains and our tongues with God so that our contributions are peace-building, encouraging and up-lifting?



In addition to this environmental service, Recy-

cle Force provides jobs for people who have formerly been incarcerated. Recycle Force helps former inmates break the cycle of the revolving prison door by providing jobs, training, and other support systems. Greg will speak at First Friends of Indianapolis at 10:30 am and at the Fellowship after. Recycle Day will be July 25 for the above mentioned articles.
