It is About a Miracle!

Many holidays throughout the year have certain themes that run parallel with the actual biblical event the holiday embraces. Christmas has become about giving, which is a very loose interpretation of the real truth that God gave His Son as a sacrifice for mankind's sin. Easter's parallel theme from the world is what....? I am not sure. Is it about new beginnings? Blossoming? Symbolizing new growth as something akin to the resurrection? I don't know.

Easter is really about the theological truth of the resurrection. It is not about the death of Jesus which was not miraculous, as all die. It is not about standing for principles to the point of death because people have done that for various causes over the history of time. No, it is about whether you believe Jesus actually rose from the dead as He said He would. In this sense it is a theological distraction from the more easily embraced secular parallel of a feel good sort of new beginning or starting over.

The scripture makes it clear and the debate about whether the dead are raised at any point after death was an issue for the apostle Paul and his critics (Sadducees) shortly after Jesus death. Here is the definitive statement from Paul on the centrality of the resurrection.

I Cor. 15: 13 But if there is no resurrection of the dead, not even Christ has been raised; 14 and if Christ has not been raised, then our preaching is vain, your faith also is vain. 15 Moreover we are even found to be false witnesses of God, because we testified against God that He raised Christ, whom He did not raise, if in fact the dead are not raised. 16 For if the dead are not raised, not even Christ has been raised; 17 and if Christ has not been raised, your faith is worthless; you are still in your sins (NASB).

We need to wrestle with the fact that the leading theologian of the New Testament is saying if you deny the resurrection there is no point in even having church. Anything short of celebrating a bodily resurrection is not on God's divine radar when He looks for true worshippers on any particular Easter Sunday. It is our privilege to reconnect with something much bigger than our minds can ever offer.

May God bless and revive the faith of His church this Easter. -Gary Jones, pastor, First Friends Kokomo

I am looking forward to gathering with you to discuss Quaker history and thought once again!



helped in the early settlement of Jackson Co., that is celebrating its 200th anniversary.



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<u>Can you imagine?</u> - typing a document or letter or a recipe on your computer, and the electricity suddenly going out? "Rats! I didn't back that up!"


In Kaimosi, Kenya, the electricity, like the water, and other services are erratic. This is frequently

Yes! said <u>WYM Outreach Board</u>. And so our 2016 Outreach Board Special Project goal is to raise \$12,000 for a new solar power project at Friends Theological College in Kaimosi, Kenya. Having a consistent source of electrical power will improve the student's ability to use computers at all times and to study at night. It will also improve overall safety on the campus after dark.

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FCNL Opportunities for Young Adults

The **Friends Committee on National Legislation (FCNL)** is expanding their programs for young people! Young adults can get hands-on experience working for peace and social justice through FCNL.

- Spring Lobby Weekend (March 12-15, 2016) will draw some 350 young adults to Washington to lobby on mass incarceration.
- Summer Internship Program (June and July 2016), for college sophomores and juniors, provides two months of experience working with FCNL's Quaker lobby in Washington, DC.
- Advocacy Corps (paid, part-time, August 2016 to May 2017) includes a 10-day training in Washington, DC followed by nine months of part-time, paid consulting work (25-35 hrs per month) organizing locally to support legislation on comprehensive immigration reform.
- Young Fellows Program (paid, full-time, September 2016 to July 2017) brings recent college grads to work in our Washington, DC office, learning how to change the world.






Special FWCC Pisac Travel Appeal

Our experience with the World Plenary Meeting in Peru exceeded all expectations. This gathering was extraordinary in that Friends were remarkably open to each other and express a longing to discover ways to work together in the world across traditions. The participation of over 90 Young Adult Friends brought a fresh energy, encouraging us as Friends to allow God to transform us. Coming from 37 countries, we were greatly enriched by our cultural diversity.

However, there were significant delays in processing visas and the additional travel costs, meaning that expenses were significantly higher than budgeted by about \$29,000. FWCC is seeking help from as many Friends as possible to meet this unexpected expense, and have asked all four sections to help. As the <u>Section of the Americas</u>, Friends can make a tax deductible contribution on the FWCC SoA website, www.FWCCAmericas.org with a note designating the contribution to the World Office Travel Fund. There will be a small administrative charge by the Section of the Americas for processing donations.

Terry Trierweiler' Travels

"The World Plenary Meeting January 2016 in Peru for FWCC was delightful with 350 Friends from 38 countries and high energy with 90 young adults. Each section lead worship once and there was daily Bible study with a professor from Cambridge and daily silent worship so it was spiritually rich and transformative. A new Rufus Jones quote to me was "With every child born is something new of God". With so much diversity it was remarkable how warm and united we felt.



Warm and sustainable meals with little added sugar were gathering times to discuss all concerns. A 30 year old female from Georgia (the country) and a 60 year old Russian male were comfortably talking. Unfortunately there is tribal conflict in Burundi. Kenyans are worried about the next election. Palestine has had a very rough year. There are at least 6 Bolivian Meetings and they seem vibrant. I enjoyed talking to many Friends from at least 25 countries so there was time for a lot of cross pollination of ideas during meals and home groups.

Consultation groups were on several topics. I chose the one on sustainability led by Jonathan Wooley from QUNO (Quaker United Nations Office) in Geneva. (little known to me a life time Quaker). Apparently he was very helpful or important at the recent Paris Climate Summit. The UN defines sustainability very



broadly. Recently FWCC has divested from all Fossil Fuel. Shortly FWCC will have a Sustainability statement that will encourage each meeting to initiate 2 or more concrete actions of sustainability within one year and will encourage one to involve youth and young adults. Local color with llamas and the local Pisac market and the trip to Machu Picchu were icing on the cake. "Terry Trierweiler tjwtmdfp@aol.com

Friends sharing together in Bible studies, meetings for worship, business meetings, consultations, home groups, over meals, personal sharing and epilogues – all of this taking place in the Sacred Valley in the middle of the Andes Mountains . . . sharing words, smiles, tears, hugs and ministry – with old and new Friends.

Thank you to those Friends who sent me off with a prayer calendar, cards to open each day and the drawing – all of which I carried around with me in my backpack. Choosing which card open and which day to open them while totally random on my part - seeming not so random at times. Thank you for your

thoughts and for the smiles and chuckles they bought me while I was on this Pilgrimage . . . as I traveled in the ministry with and among Friends. I'm looking forward to sharing more about my experiences and the World Plenary during Yearly Meeting in July and with Friends around the Yearly Meeting in the coming months.

While it can be said that it's good to be home I'm still adjusting and . . I'm missing being with my Friends but feeling blessed by this experience. "

John Cadbury was one of ten children of Richard Tapper Cadbury, a prominent Quaker who had moved to Birmingham, England from the West Country in 1794.

In 1824, 22-year-old John Cadbury opened his first shop at 93 Bull Street, next to his father's drapery and silk business in the then fashionable part of Birmingham. Apart from selling tea and coffee, John Cadbury sold hops, mustard and a new sideline - cocoa and drinking chocolate, which he prepared using a mortar and pestle.

John Cadbury made his first "French eating Chocolate" in 1842, but it was not until 1875 that the first Cadbury Easter Eggs were made. Progress in the chocolate Easter egg market was slow until a method was found for making the chocolate flow into the molds. Decorative skill and variety bloomed and by 1893 there were 19 different lines on the Cadbury Brothers Easter list in the UK. Richard Cadbury's artistic skill undoubtedly played an important part in the development of the Easter range. Many of his designs were based on French, Dutch and German originals adapted to Victorian tastes. Germany came up with the 'crocodile' finish, which by breaking up the smooth surface, disguised minor imperfections. This was the forerunner to the many distinctive finishes now available.
