#### From the Least to the Greatest

We moved to the farm where we now live in 1960. When spring came, we found that the yard had been neglected and was full of weeds and dandelions. We hoed and pulled and dug weeds and dandelions and still they came. This was before we had chemicals to kill the weeds. As our farming operations changed, fences were removed and the yard area increased—thus more dandelions.

Years later came a long, very cold and snowy winter with many nights 20 degrees below zero. It seemed that spring would never come. When spring came, it was still cold, with piles of dirty snow in various places in the yard and fields. One day, I was taking my kitchen peelings to be tossed in the field to be eaten by the birds. As I passed by a very large pile of dirty snow, I looked down, and there at the edge of that dirty snow was—yes, a beautiful yellow bloom with green leaves, a dandelion!! A sign that warmer weather would soon come. How amazing that our God puts beauty in unexpected places to help us realize that our hope is in Him. How amazing that our experiences change our outlook of things we once thought ugly and unwanted to become something beautiful—even dandelions.

When our walk with God becomes closer and more dear, we find many things we desired are no longer important—even a yard free of dandelions. We are reminded of the words of Jesus in Matthew 6:28, "consider the lilies of the field, how they grow, they toil not, neither do they spin, and yet I say unto you that even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these."

God's creation is a beautiful work from the tallest mountain to the smallest dandelion.







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## 2016 Western Yearly Meeting Report

Western Yearly Meeting (WYM) held its annual sessions from July 14-17, 2016 at Plainfield, Indiana. The theme for the sessions was "So that Faith, Truth and Love Might Flourish" from 2 Thessalonians 1:3 "...thank God for you, because your faith is flourishing and your love for one another is growing."

Scott Wagoner from Deep River Meeting in North Carolina Yearly Meeting led our devotions each day and delivered the sermon on Sunday. He spoke about the Energy in our Meetings and how to nourish it and make it flourish. He discussed the theme of discipleship which was a continuation of the Spiritual Retreat in April of this past year.

The Quaker lecture was given by Jonathan Vogel Borne. Attendance at this session was larger than it has been in several years. He spoke about "The mark of true discipleship-The flourishing of faith, truth, and love among us". He and his wife Minga Claggett Borne conducted two workshops. The first was on the Alternatives to Violence Program (AVP) which was started in the prisons and is currently being used in New York. The second was on Contentious Conversation, how to approach those with whom we disagree.

A synopsis of the State of Societies was presented. Most feel that we are in good spiritual health but are declining in young people attending our Meetings.

Upon the recommendation of Executive Committee, the Yearly Meeting approved hiring Andrew Heald as the full time Christian Education Director beginning at the rise of Yearly Meeting in 2016 until the rise of Yearly Meeting sessions in 2018. He has currently served as the partial Interim Christian Education

Director.

The Financial Trustees have noticed that the Retired Ministers' Fund is lagging this year. They noted that Estate gifts are being accepted. They have arranged for electronic fund transfers to pay the monthly payments to retired ministers. It was approved that 4.75% of investment

funds be distributed for expenses of the Yearly Meeting during the 2017 year.

It was approved that the 2016 Property Trustees' budget be increased by \$10,000 for the

painting of the Yearly Meeting building and the office.

Assessments are expected to increase by approximately 3.8% in 2017.

The operating budget for 2017 was approved.

The Board on Christian Education encouraged Meetings to look at the Affirmation Curriculum that Indianapolis First Friends has developed. For those Meetings needing money to help fund some of the field trips suggested, the CE Board offered to help defray the cost.



As of June 30, 2016 Pastoral Ministries Excellence (PME) has collected \$74,313.00 toward their goal of \$100,000. There are several ways to contribute to this fund.

The Board on Christian Ministries and Evangelism (CM&E) reported the following:

- There will be another Spiritual Retreat for members from April 28-30, 2017 with pastors staying through May 1.
  - John Connell from Mooresville Friends has been accepted into the Training and Recording Process.


At 9:30 AM on Sunday we were led in worship by musicians from all over WYM. It also included


numbers from a young Guatemalan and two daughters from missionaries in Bolivia.

## Action Items from Western Yearly Meeting In Session July 14-17, 2016

Approved employing Andrew Heald as full-time Director of Christian Education, beginning at the rise of yearly meeting sessions 2016 through yearly meeting sessions 2018.

Approved up to \$1,200 for funding expenses of searches for both the Director of Christian Education and for Administrative Assistant positions, to be paid from excess monies in the General Fund.

Approved distribution from Financial Trustees of 4.75% from endowment for 2017.

Approved amending the 2016 Budget, adding \$10,000.00 for Property Trustees to assist with needed expenses of upkeep. This was due in part to unexpected expense of dealing with infected and dead Ash trees.

Approved Board on Finance recommendations for Financial Trustees through December 2019, of Beth Henricks (Indianapolis First Friends) and David Whicker (Hadley), and for Benevolence Treasurer through December 2019, of Sylvia Graves (West Newton).

Approved the 2017 Budget as presented, with a total of \$227,074, and the Friends United Meeting Goal of \$102, 500.

Approved for Recording Beth Henricks and Katherine Murray, both from Indianapolis First Friends. Approved the recommendations of the Nominating Committee. The incoming Clerk of Western Yearly Meeting is Sarah Lookabill (Fairfield).

Approved a minute from the Board on Peace and Christian Social Concerns regarding mandatory minimum sentencing for low-level, nonviolent drug offenses.


Approved the Outgoing Epistles of the Young Friends and of Western Yearly Meeting.

Everyone was so super excited to spend a few hours touring Hooverland and hearing all about how Herbert Hoover was the most excel-



lent President, Quaker, and Human Being by their uber-knowledgeable Youth Group Leader Chase Slaughter.

We arrived at the Mesquakie Friends Center in Tama, lowa in the late afternoon and met Mac and Bernie MacDonald, the Directors. The Center is absolutely beautiful. They have 40 acres and a lovely pond.

Tama has a 7% Native American population and a 7% Hispanic population. Much of Mac and Bernie's ministry is centered around youth in the area and they have a very active youth group. The area is plagued by extreme poverty and drug and alcohol abuse.

The young people did an excellent job doing a lot of tasks around the Center. It is also very important to note that one of the main focuses of this trip was not just about work; it was to deepen our own spirituality as well as bond together as

a group . We did a lot of worshiping/reflecting both together and with the wider body of Friends.

Mesquakie Friends meets on Saturday night so we worshiped in their Meetinghouse with Mac and Bernie and about 10 locals. Sunday morning, we accompanied Mac and Bernie to Grinnell Friends Church in Grinnell, lowa where we worshiped.

From Tama, we traveled to Cedar Rapids to the United Society of Friends Women International /Quaker Men International Triennial. During this time, we got to experience deep times of spiritual renewal and worship. We also got to meet Friends from all over the world and experience forms of Quaker worship that are different than our own. The Young Friends had their own program led by Pastor Anthony Nieuwsma of Grinnell Friends Church. They did a service project and spent time in worship and



reflection. The Youth program of the Triennial also enabled the kids to meet young people from Kenya and Ramallah.

## **Ending Hunger as a Case Study for System Change**

Fall class at Christian Theological Seminary

Bringing real change to the world means changing its systems. Using the end of hunger — a goal now in reach within a generation — as a case study whose lessons can be applied to other pressing challenges and opportunities, Dr. Matthew Myer Boulton, and Dr. David Miner will lead this course. Students will explore the key skills and best practices involved in changing systems, as well as the biblical and theological perspectives through which people of faith can lead systems change in the 21st century. Guest experts in theology, hunger and systems change will also contribute to the course. Each participant in the class will lead a hunger advocacy project with support from an experienced hunger activist.
