Getting our Eggs in Order (the following devotion is from the West Newton Friend, Jan.

2002. Elizabeth was 12 years old. Wanda Coffin Baker, the author, was much younger, too. We also had two growing boys – Howie and Kenny).

My daughter, Elizabeth, re-orders my eggs in the refrigerator door. She lines them up, or puts them all on one side or the other of the tray.

I don't know why she does that I used to get mad at her, and tell her to quit

I don't know why she does that. I used to get mad at her, and tell her to quit playing with the eggs. But then in a day or two, I'd open the door and they would be changed again.

Finally, I decided it didn't matter. She has never broken one (that I know of), and we never need to worry about using the old eggs first. They aren't around that long.

There are so many important things to deal with when kids are growing up, I decided to let this one slide. And I thought I had, until last night. I opened the refrigerator, and Elizabeth had been there before me.

Now, I do not consider myself a stick-in-the-mud, though I occasionally find myself up to my elbows in muck.

Assigning kids chores and being away for committee meetings tend to make you more tolerant. I don't really care if all the underwear goes into the drawers folded, as long as it is clean. The cans and boxes of groceries don't really need to be organized by variety, as long as they get put away. My pans and dishes don't have to be in one certain place, as long as they are close. (I did once lose a saucepan lid for 3 months after being away for a week.)

Occasionally, however, when I am in a hurry, and trying to get too much done at once, and I can't find something, and no one knows where it is, because, of course, no one had it last, I lose my cool. And as the saying goes, "If Momma ain't happy, ain't nobody happy."

After a while, I repent and have to admit that in the scope of world events, this wasn't as important as I made it out to be. It's more important that the kids learn to be responsible and help around the house. They need those skills to grow up.

In Matthew 6:28-34, Jesus spoke to the crowds on the mountain slope. He talked about "things" and "worry." Seek first God's kingdom and his righteousness, he advised, and all these things will be yours as well.

Consider what things are important, he said, before you consider putting your eggs in order. What will bring in God's kingdom?

Two sets of spectacles!

Every day I wake up and put on my glasses. Without them, I am unable to see clearly. What is blurry suddenly becomes clear through the corrective lenses.

But, they are not the only lenses I put on each morning! I spend time reading and applying God's Word, and that becomes the lens through which I view all of life. I look at the world through the lens of my worldview.

A worldview is the framework of basic beliefs that we hold, whether we realize it or not, which shapes our view of the world. Each morning, time spent reading and meditating on the Bible helps reinforce and correct my thinking, ensuring I face life with a biblical worldview. We all have a worldview and it has huge significance. It affects what we believe about God, marriage, politics, morality, social structures, the raising of children, etc.

In our culture today, there is a clash of worldviews. Those who do not believe in God or the authority of God's Word, look at the world through different lens than the Christian. That is why it is important for us, not only to put on physical glasses, but to spend time each day in God's Word, to keep our vision sharp and clear.

Legislative Priorities for FCNL - 350 Quakers from around the country met in Washington DC for the annual meeting of Friends Committee on National Legislation (FCNL)on November 10th -13th. Several from First Friends attended and the legislative priorities for FCNL over the next 2 years were approved (see them here: https://goo.gl/Zukhzo). We also lobbied our Senators and Representatives on supporting passage of Criminal Justice reform for non-violent offenders in the lame duck session. If you are interested, call your Senators and ask them to support Senate Bill S2123 and your Representative to support bills in the house HR 3713 and HR 759.
