Dear Friends, We know our mothers in so many ways - through biology, love, laughter and wise counsel. And also by community and nature, as in the shelter, strength, cradling and catching of tears. Not all of us received tender mothering; for some it was a challenging relationship of "catching it" when our dad got home or some other way of our actions catching up to us. Some of us got some mothering from an aunt, a grandmother, or even a dad, or from a sympathetic woman in our school, Meeting or neighborhood.

I was well-known by the young mothers around my neighborhood and the nuns at my elementary school. It wasn't because I had a mean mom or anything like that. My mother was the root of music and games in my house. But with the kid-count putting us in the running for the largest family in the neighborhood, Mom was pretty busy taking care of the youngest ones. She was also the one who attracted her own number of ragtag kids and taught us to play street ball, kick-the-can, and steal-the-bacon. She bought learning games before learning games prepared you for preschool entrance exams.

Occasionally, she'd be invited to school to fill in for one of the nuns in the classroom. Because of her experience with kids, I guess they trusted her to maintain control. When I became a teacher myself as a young nun, with no college or even a desire to be a teacher, I wove play and encouragement into the lessons just as my mother had.

Looking back, though, I am grateful for the women in the neighborhood who helped each other out. Today, I see the women in our Meeting as heirs of the tradition of shared mothering and see them appreciating the young children and mothers who have brought new energy and life to Valley Mills. This month of May we remember all the mothers and mother-fathers, the Friends and neighbors and teachers who nurtured us and the ones who continue the gift of loving and lifting up with encouragement. It certainly does take a village, doesn't it? Happy Mother's Day and Mothers' Month. We celebrate you.

Indian Table


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Yearly meeting will be here before you know it! First I want to thank everyone who donated to the Indian table offerings last year and volunteered to work.

A year never goes by without a bumper crop of creativity and love!

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
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Purpose
