
FRANKLIN TOWNSHIP — The congregation of the one-room Quaker church arrived for Sunday school to find a message on the blackboard.

Our son, Donald, has been a semi driver for more than 35 years. He was driving on a rural highway several miles from a town when the engine began losing power. He was able to get to a grain farm and pull into the driveway. The farmer approached and was told the problem with the engine. As they were talking, a neighbor of the farmer stopped to visit. The neighbor was a mechanic working on semi engines. He was able to fix the problem.


Another time Donald became ill as he was driving. He pulled into a truck stop and then collapsed on the pavement – just as two EMTs had finished their lunch break and were returning to their ambulance. They then transported him to a hospital for treatment.

One day he came upon a road closure because of an accident involving a semi. He would be delayed for a long time so he went to see if he could help the rescue workers who were working to free the injured driver. Other workers were trying to stabilize the loaded trailer.

He was dismayed to see that those workers were unaware of their great danger. If they continued the trailer would topple over on them. He knew how to stabilize the trailer – then instructed and helped get the trailer secured so the rescue workers could continue helping the injured driver.

Everyone could relate stories similar to these. It is not luck or happenstance – If we are faithful our Lord will use our talents & abilities at the right time at the right place.

We have the story in the Bible of young David who was skilled with his sling as he watched his father's flock. David's father, Jesse, sent him with food for his brothers who were in Saul's army. The dreaded giant of the Philistines had taunted the Israelites for 40 days. When David arrived and heard Goliath taunts, he went to Saul and said "I can fight him." We know the story of how young David using his sling killed the giant. Another story of being in the right time at the right place with right skills and ability.

Indiana Friends Committee on Legislation

One of IFCL's most gratifying accomplishments in the legislative session that concluded last week was our success in helping stop the predatory Payday Lending Bill, HB1319. This bill would have tripled the allowable annual percentage (APR) of unsecured consumer installment loans. Despite passing in the House, HB1319 faltered after it was sent to the Senate Commerce and Technology Committee. IFCL had a leading role in reversing this bill's initial momentum, by focusing lawmaker's attention on its moral implications, and persuading them that HB1319 would put some of the state's most economically troubled citizens at perilous risk.

Nonetheless, the payday industry lobbyists vow that this issue will be brought forward again. Many thanks for your ongoing support of IFCL - now in its 46th year! Tom Roberts



The Light Shines Forth, by Bob Henry, pastor of **Indianapolis First Friends**

Does our art welcome, represent, and inspire *all* people as they enter into our Meetinghouse?

These are just a few of the reasons, I have decided to begin creating new Quaker art. In my first, The Light Shines Forth (20"x20" acrylic on canvas) I utilized a similar style to that of the African piece that had inspired me by Twin Seven-Seven. Not only did I want it to convey our Quaker distinctives, I also sensed a need to tell a story of our rich history of social action while including faces from several different cultures and races. I chose the historic Quaker grays to represent the equality among us and yellow to represent the importance of the Light

You may also note that Margaret Fell takes a slightly higher position in the center over George Fox to show the importance of the leadership of women from the very beginning among Quakers.
