Watching the Leaves Fall

When I walk over the office from the Friends Apartments I sometimes take the "long way." I walk around the whole building, noticing if anything is out of place and how the trees and shrubs are doing. The view changes from week to week and season to season, so it is always an interesting walk.

This morning one of the older trees began dropping leaves. One would drop, followed by another in 10 or 15 seconds, followed by still another. Of course this is only a light rainfall of leaves that will be followed by showers and then torrents of leaves. We are privileged. Many people live in places where these beautiful fall showers do not happen.

Trees drop their leaves because it is time to drop them. The leaves grow for a purpose. Leaves of different trees have very different shapes and sizes, but they share a common purpose. The leaves provide the energy to grow fruit and seeds. In the fall, when the leaves are no longer needed and the tree must be ready for the winter, the leaves are dropped.

Sometimes we hold on to things that we don't need. We can allow our lives to be cluttered with possessions, or unnecessary wants, or unhealthy and unhelpful attitudes. We need to learn from the trees and let go of what we don't need.



And as we let go, we discover that new life grows in and around us.

Get rid of all bitterness, rage and anger, brawling and slander, along with every form of malice. Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you.

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HOW CAN I CONTRIBUTE REGULARLY WHEN I DON'T ATTEND WORSHIP REGULARLY?

Hello, Friends!

As most of you know, I've been on the Prayer Concerns List since last October when I underwent yet more surgery for cancer of the tongue. For a non-smoker, this has been an ongoing ordeal for me. I'm now on a feeding tube and a schedule that has a mid-morning feeding which falls between the Sunday School and Worship times on Sundays, so I've been unable to attend worship. Between feeding conflicts, general tiredness and a driving ban, which was recently revised to allow local driving when I'm not tired, not being able to attend worship means I was unable to drop my tithe in the collection plate on Sundays. Even when I attended worship before surgery however, I didn't drop an envelope in the plate! Why not?

Quite a while back it was suggested we offer our congregation the option of using our bank's online bill paying capabilities to make regular donations to Mooresville Friends Church. I was one of two volunteers to set up trial methods of regular payments to the church. It worked out very well, so I never discontinued my automatic deduction/payment. I did change from weekly to monthly deductions, but that's the only change I've made to my auto pay. I have to say that over the preceding months I've felt extremely thankful to have one less worry — how to continue financial support of my church when I was unable to be in attendance. I highly suggest those of you who are comfortable with online bill paying give it a try - especially if you're unable to attend worship regularly. Just check with the Treasurer or a Finance Committee member for the information you need to set up your own auto pay account with your bank.



Devotions – Jay Newlin, Planfield Friends Meeting newsletter. From: 40 Days of Prayer for the Future of Friends Day 28 ~ "Gathered In Community" As A People Who Build One Another Up

I had a conversation with my son not long ago in which I told him about a specific person who I was finding very difficult to love. He thought about this for a moment then said, "God has no trouble loving this person. God is around him one-hundred percent of the time—and God enjoys spending time with him." I had never thought about it that way before. God enjoys the people we might prefer to avoid? How amazing is that!

There is a difference between the people we choose for community and the people who actually are in community with us. That is, we naturally choose to be close to those we find agreeable, understandable, likeminded, and pleasant. But in life—and in Meeting for Worship, at church potlucks, on committees, and at wider Quaker gatherings—we sometimes find ourselves in very close association with others who are not necessarily any of those things! However, are we called to be in community only with those who are easy to love? The world of Friends United Meeting includes people who are diverse in many ways: culturally, theologically, politically, etc. For some, the diversity is too broad and too challenging. Yet others discover something dynamic in that diversity—namely that God is present within it, God designed it, and God hopes we will grow because of it. Our mission in the world is stronger because of the depth of our community. To achieve that level of community, accepting others gets us started. But we must become the kind of people who actively take the next steps to build one another up.

Living A Query, by Beth Henricks, CE and Family Pastor at Indianapolis First Friends


Last week I was sitting in my office and someone tapped on my window. There was Daud Abdur-Rahman outside. As many of you know, Daud is an Imam and attended Nur-Allah Islamic Center on 46th St near Keystone. Five years ago, he showed up one Sunday morning and kept coming back most Sundays and became involved in Sunday School and in outreach. He developed deep friendships with many of us. He became part of our fellowship and even gave the message one Sunday morning. He and his wife Lillian moved to Alabama a year ago but when he returns to Indianapolis he often stops by to say hello and check in on us.

Daud loves the Quakers and described his experience worshipping with us as deeply significant for him. He is looking to connect with Quakers in Alabama, but he has not found the same experience as he did at First Friends. We reminisced about hosting an appreciation ceremony together at School 43, his friendship with Duffy Fankboner (that changed both of them) and this amazing and holy experience we had during our Affirmation class three years ago.

One of our lessons in Affirmation is looking at other religions and how Quakerism compares. We invited the youth from Nur Allah to come and share an abbreviated Muslim service with us, eat with us and hang out with us. There were about 10 young people as well as a couple of adults including Daud that joined us. We had an incredible gathering that I will never forget, sharing worship, food and conversation with each other. That afternoon broke down any perceived barriers of difference or labels between us. These kids - black, white, Muslim and Quaker - were just kids with each other. Both Daud and I talked about how powerful this experience was of understanding, acceptance and sacredness.

My friendship with Daud has changed me. I got to know someone very different from me but a deeply spiritual person that I learned from and who showed me the Spirit's breadth and depth in a new way. We may use different words to describe our experiences, but we have great similarities in how the Divine transforms our heart and calls us into action into the world. Our Meeting was blessed to have Daud in our community and he continues to be a blessing in this world.

How do we step outside of our homogenous world and develop friendships and relationships with people different than us?
